5.	Treasurer's Report: Amanda's report is attached with these minutes. A very generous Legacy of £12500 had been received from the estate of Patricia Brown, a past member of Martlesham branch. Mrs Brown had expressed a wish that the overseas MU project should be included in the projects that her legacy funds. Trustees have voted for £5,000 to be designated for a new overseas project, 'One more Step'. 'One More Step' builds on the Literacy and numeracy project with the set-up of Savings and credit for agribusinesses. Members were made aware that they could apply for funding from this legacy for new MU projects in their communities, that further the aims and objectives of the MU. 	<ul> <li>The theme for the past year had been, 'Transformation Now' with members encouraged to think outside the box for future fund-raising. The DP highlighted two initiatives undertaken by other branches in England: <ul> <li>'Knicker Nights' (Liverpool): an evening event to receive donations of knickers, including period knickers to be given to the local women's refuges.</li> <li>'Evening Mothers' Unions (EMU)' meetings have been started to enable working women to attend MU meetings and events.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Under any questions, Christine Ward asked if members would pray for ongoing work in modern slavery and for survivors of domestic abuse.</li> </ul>	
6.	Jane Sheat (Diocesan Director of Education): 'Supporting our C of E Schools: Mrs Sheat leads a team of six in the Diocese's Education Team. 87 of the 320 schools in Suffolk are Church of England schools (85 primary and 2 secondary). The vision of the Education Team is to 'Enable schools to flourish'. A key approach to achieve this aim is to support headteachers. School-funding is very tight and this is likely to remain the situation for the foreseeable future. She presented some practical initiatives where Mothers' Union members could support their local C of E School.  • 'Open the Book' (which many members are actively involved with)  • Providing books, games, toys and some sports equipment for schools  • MU Trustees are looking to partner with the Christian sports charity, 'KICK', to run holiday camps for pupils of C of E schools located in areas of deprivation.

7. Xe	erxes Maghanoy: 'Mothers' Union Enterprise': Mr Maghanoy has recently joined the MU		
as	s its 'Retail and E-commerce Manager', a key member of its marketing team. Part of his		
ro	ole and remit is to review current, and also introduce new products for MU.		
	He began by showing members a new dress which has been designed and made in		
	Oxford by the charity, 'Dorcas Trust'. This charity supports under-privileged women		
	and women forced to leave their country for fear of persecution, abuse or		
	imprisonment. The dress is made in only one size, and is said to fit sizes 6-24. The		
	cost is £99. Its design, material and colour cannot be changed. It has been produced		
	in time for the 150 <sup>th</sup> anniversary of the MU in 2026. The dress was modelled by one		
	of the members, Sarah Nicholson. Members' unanimous response was that the		
	price was excessive. There was also considerable doubt that one size would fit all		
	sizes and shapes and also that it would not be worn at MU events. A couple of		
	members asked if there could be something for men to wear, such as T-shirts or		
	polo-shirts with the refreshed MU logo. Other suggestions included a tie, waistcoat		
	and cufflinks. Members were told that a collared shirt will be available.		
	<ul> <li>Mr Maghanoy requested feedback on other products sold by MU – many of which were on sale at the 'pop-up' shop at the meeting. Most members were very happy</li> </ul>		
	with the range of Christmas and Easter cards; however, it was clear that there was a		
	preference for designs to have a Christian theme to reflect the Christian ethos of		
	the MU. The scripture verses (inside the cards) were popular although a few		
	members felt that there should be a range of cards which should be blank, as not all		
	recipients of the cards would have a faith or be 'religious'.
